

I picked up this book some time ago thanks to a recommendation I found online, and just now got around to reading it. I should have waited even longer. It started out intriguing enough: staunchily practical American woman inherits a manor in Cornwall through some convoluted will by her manytimes removed cousin. It comes complete with a curse that happens every 200 years and - just so neat! - it happens to be almost exactly 200 years since the last tragedy. Carla falls very squarely into Mary Sue-ville: no real flaws to speak of; every man she comes into contact with falls instantly in love with her; and look, she just so happens to resemble the poor lady who last fell victim to the curse. Oh, and of course, she unravels the family mystery. No real characterization to speak of; it's in third-person, but so limited that we only get part of her thoughts. She doesn't seem to care too much what might happen; the most excitement we get out of her is when she discovers antiques in the attic that are actually worth money. It's revealed at the end that she's infatuated with one of the male characters, but we get no sense of that, no hint, not even any "I hate him I hate him I hate him oh it must be love!" trope through the book. Even after finishing the book, I have no real idea who she is as a person. The action scenes are poorly written - everything seems so mechanical and there's practically no buildup of suspense, so what little action does happen is over with so guickly you're left wondering what just happened. The villain comes out of nowhere and his motive and work are so contrived that it induced too many WTH? moments to take seriously.
